Penguins

Penguins are birds that cannot fly. The name 'penguin' comes from the Welsh words *pen*, meaning 'head', and *gwyn*, meaning 'white' – 'white head'!

There are 17 species of penguin, which are all slightly different from each other. All of the species live in the southern hemisphere, mainly at the South Pole. They can also be found on the coasts of South America, the Galapagos Islands, Australia, Africa and New Zealand. In total, there might be as many as 100 million penguins in the world! Just



imagine if they were all huddled together in one place!

Penguins waddle when they walk. They have black and white feathers and a torpedo-shaped body that helps them to speed through the water (they can travel at speeds of up to 25 miles an hour!). Most of the time penguins are in the water looking for food. They are excellent swimmers: they can spin, jump and dive whilst searching for food, but they cannot swim backwards! They can hold their breath underwater for about six minutes. When moving from the water to the land, they can launch themselves six feet into the air.

A penguin's main diet is fish but they also eat squid, krill and crustaceans. They have a hook at the end of their bill which helps them to grab their food. They also have bristles that face backwards on their tongues to stop slippery seafood from getting away. Penguins have a special gland in their bodies that takes the salt out of the seawater they drink, so that they actually swallow filtered water!
